Joy

- **I.** Joy is a diving enabling (Gal. 5:22).
 - 1. Joy (noun), rejoice (verb), also translated 'glad,' etc.
 - 2. Joy uses in natural sense.
 - 1) Is the opposite of gloom, dejection, morn, lament, sadness (Jam. 4:9; Jn. 16:20; Heb. 12:11).
 - 2) Joy is the mental willingness to accept and appreciate any circumstance, without resentment or frustration.
 - 3) Joy is mental, in the realm of the human spirit—not soulish or emotional.
- **II.** Joy functioning as part of the Fruit from the Spirit.
 - 1. Jesus the example of divine quality of joy (Heb. 12:2).
 - 2. Christians can have joy during trials and tribulations (1 Thes 1:6; Heb. 10:34; Col. 1:24; 1 Pet. 4:13).
 - 3. Joy is 'overseen' by love (1 Cor. 13:6-7).
 - 4. Joy works in concert with other facets of the Fruit from the Spirit (Rom. 15:13; Col. 1:11).
 - 5. Joy delights in the spiritual growth of other Christians (Phil. 2:17-18; Col. 2:5; 2 Jn. 4; 3 Jn. 4).
 - 6. There can be joy in temptation (Jam. 1:2-3).
 - 7. There is no joy for the carnal Christian (Heb. 12:11).

III. Complete joy.

- 1. In fulfilling the New Commandment (1 Jn. 2:7-8; 5:13).
- 2. Having a consistent frame of mind (1 Thes. 5:16).
- 3. As a frame of mind when communicating with the Father (Phil. 1:4; 1 Thes. 5:16-17).
