The Mysteries regarding the Church at Ephesus

- I. Two sets of mysteries regarding each church (Rev. 1:19-20).
 - 1. Mystery regarding the messenger/pastor, that he will receive both the blame and the credit of the church's behavior (Jam. 3:1; Heb. 13:17).
 - 2. Mystery regarding the church;
 - 1) Their work related to the Image symbolizing judgment.
 - 2) Their destiny as predictive of a future major movement in Christendom.
 - 3) The promise to the overcomer—the true believer.
 - 4) Ephesus, 'desirable', represents the Church when the apostles and other revelatory gifts were operating.
- **II.** Ephesus portrays the early church during the transition from the Old to New Testament circa 33 to 100 AD.
 - 1. They were well taught.
 - 2. They were 'proper.'
 - 3. Their works all reflect their own strength.
 - 4. They 'sent away' ("left" KJV) their first love—a divine enabling; therefore, they lacked divine enabling.
 - 5. They had fallen from their place of blessing (v. 5).
 - 6. They needed to change their mind regarding practicing the New Commandment (v. 5).
 - 7. The consequence of not changing their mind and behavior, is they will be removed from their association with Christ (v. 5).
 - 8. They detested the Nicolaitanes (v. 6). '*Nicao*' means conquer. '*Laos*' means people. Together = "*conquer the people*". A reference to the separation between the 'clergy' and the 'layman', an apparent movement in the early church.
- **III.** The promise to the Overcomer (v. 7).
 - 1. Who is the Overcomer?
 - 1) The Overcomer is the New Testament saint (1 Jn. 5:5-7).
 - 2) Who has ears? (cf. Mt. 13:13).
 - 3) There is potentially a true believer in all seven churches.
 - 2. The Tree of Life is currently located in Paradise at the edge of the Third Heaven, it was in the Garden of Eden (2 Cor. 12:2).
 - 1) It sustains physical life (Gen. 3:22-23).
 - 2) It is not required by glorified bodies (1 Cor. 15:35-55).
 - i. Old Test. saints till resurrection after Tribulation.
 - ii. New Test. saints till the Rapture.
 - iii. Millenium saints live for 1,000 years.
