## The Fall of Adam and Eve

- **I.** What is sin? What is a transgression?
  - 1. Humans sin against God (Ps. 51:4).
    - 1) Sin is sin when God calls it sin.
    - 2) All sin is unrighteous but not all unrighteousness is sin; 'unrighteousness' is a larger term, including sin.
  - 2. Sin is lawlessness—acting as though God has no restraints, limits (1 Jn. 3:4).
  - 3. A transgression is breaking a negative law from God (Rom. 4:15).
- **II.** The temptation to Eve (Gen. 3:1-6).
  - 1. Satan's deceitful ploy to Eve, using the pre-curse snake.
    - 1) No being in the universe had experienced physical death.
    - 2) Most of what Satan states is true (about 90%).
      - i. They will know good and evil.
      - ii. Their eyes will be opened to their own desires.
      - iii. They will be like gods.
    - 3) The lie was that they will not die—no consequences.
  - 2. Eve was completely deceived (2 Cor. 11:3; 1 Tim. 2:13-14).
  - 3. Eve transgressed a law from God.
  - 4. Eve determined to be wise: know good and evil.
- III. The Temptation of Adam (Gen. 3:6, 12).
  - 1. Adam saw that Eve no longer had a garment of light.
  - 2. Would he join her in her state, or would he remain in his state and be separated from her?
  - 3. Adam determined to be in the same condition as Eve, rather than remain different, keeping God's image.
  - 4. Adam sinned (Rom. 5:12).
- IV. The consequences of the transgressions of Adam and Eve.
  - 1. The woman is cursed.
    - 1) The birth process is sped up and becomes painful.
    - 2) The woman becomes the lesser in the hierarchy of the home.
  - 2. The ground and plant life are cursed, changed.
  - 3. Adam is not directly cursed.
