The Inner Man- Trials part 10

- **I.** The inner man pictures the new birth as it relates to the individual Christian: one's relationship the three Persons of the Godhead.
 - 1. The outer man represents our relationship to that which is physical, normal existence (2 Cor. 4:16).
 - 2. The inner man represents our spiritual relationship to God: supernatural.
 - 3. It is in the inner man that we receive strength to endure trials (2 Cor. 7:4).
- **II.** Romans chapter 7:14-25 is a historical account of when Paul, after becoming a New Testament believer, lived under grace then went back under The Law, and thus gave his sin nature opportunity to thrive and dominate (Rom. 7:9-10; 7-8).
 - 1. Paul's missing 7 to 10 years (Acts 9:30 to 11:25).
 - 2. In Tarsus, his home he was disowned, banished from the local synagogue, beaten, dealing with his sin nature.
- **III.** Romans 7:14-25, two natures, two desirous wills.
 - 1. V. 14. Paul is carnal—sin nature dominating his actions.
 - 2. V. 15. Paul's sin nature works out what his new nature does not desire to do: hates non-violently.
 - 3. V. 16. Paul's sin nature does, by design, what his new nature does not desire to do. His new nature agrees that The Law is useful for his carnal state.
- **IV.** (Key: *n.n.*= new nature; *s.n.*= sin nature)
 - **14.** For I indeed know intellectually the Law is spiritual, but I am carnal, having been sold under the sin nature. **15.** For what I (the sin nature) work out, I (the new nature) do not know experientially. For what I (n.n.) do not desirously will, I (s.n.) practice; but what I (n.n.) am hating non-violently, I (s.n.) am doing. **16.** But since I (s.n.) am doing what I (n.n.) do not desirously will, I (n.n.) agree with the Law (Mosaic) that it is useful in the carnal state.
